May is Teen Pregnancy Awareness Month

Teen pregnancy rates are declining, and programs such as ours are part of the reason for that. FLCH receives Title X funding which is focused on preventing unintended pregnancy, reducing STIs, and increasing education for youth and adults around reproductive health. Our program empowers youth to make healthy, well-informed decisions, and provides them with the tools and resources to practice safe sex if they feel they are ready to have sex. We aim to remove the negativity that surrounds sexual health and the negative impacts lack of education can have on our community. According to the CDC, teen pregnancy and childbearing have very negative social and economic effects on our society. In 2010, teen pregnancy and childbirth cost at least 9.4 billion dollars in taxpayer money due to increased health care, foster care, incarceration rates, and lost tax revenue due to lower education attainment of teen mothers. Teen pregnancy also increases risk of young women dropping out of high school, with statistics from the CDC stating about 50% of teen mothers will receive their high school diploma by age 22. Children born to teen parents are more likely to have lower school achievement themselves, drop out of school, have worse health, be incarcerated, face unemployment,

and repeat the cycle of being teen parents. Our program aims to promote health equity among youth. We want to empower youth (and adults) to think before engaging in sexual activity. Sexuality is a normal part of healthy development, so we work with caregivers, teachers, youth, and adults alike to ensure that preventative conversations are happening. This month (and always) we aim to continue that work and help empower our community to build each individual's life! Sexual assault is any type of forced or coerced sexual contact or behavior that happens without consent. Sexual assault includes rape and attempted rape, child molestation, and sexual harassment or threats. Nearly 1 in 5 women and 1 in 6 men has been raped and/or assaulted. If you have been sexually assaulted, it is not your fault. Safe Harbors of the Finger Lakes offers services for individuals who have experienced any form of sexual assault, coerced sexual contact, sexual harassment, or any unwanted sexual behavior. Safe Harbors provides support with Sexual Assault Forensic Exams Referrals, accompaniment during sexual assault forensic exams and accompaniment through the legal process, along with crisis intervention, and support groups for survivors of Child Sexual Abuse, Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence. All of the services provided are free, immediate, and always confidential.

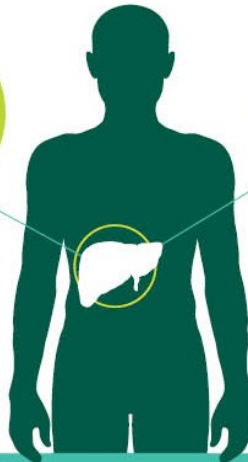

HEPATITIS C

Hepatitis C is curable and early treatment can prevent severe complications such as cirrhosis or liver cancer.

Approximately
3.2 MILLION
people in the United States are living with a chronic hepatitis C virus infection.

People born between
1945 AND 1965
are **5 times more**
likely to be infected with hepatitis C.



3 out of every 4 people with hepatitis C do not know they are infected, because they don't look or feel sick.

Hepatitis C is a disease that causes an inflamed liver. Hepatitis C rates are rising in rural areas in women, under 30 due, in part to rates of increased drug use. Hepatitis is spread by contaminated blood, which can be transmitted during IV drug use, unsterile tattoo equipment, or sexual contact. Symptoms may include fatigue, nausea, loss of appetite, and yellowing of the eyes and skin. Hepatitis C can be cured through a medication regimen. Lab tests may be used to check for the virus in someone's blood and to see how long it has been present.
